Moreover, the proposed project promotes the integration of Roma youth and children, through intercultural dialogue to reduce social disparities.

Project results

1. Created an aggregation space aimed at women where they can confront and implement their skills and work skills
2. 20 women trained on textile sector and increased family incomes.
3. 80 women improved their knowledge on the topics of financial management, self-determination and human rights
4. Increased participation of Roma children (at least 60) in art, non-formal education and sport activities with other 150 children at the youth center.
